Mountain Dulcimer Music Fest 2022 Workshop Leaders



Carolyn Brodginski was a quick study when she finally got her hands on a mountain dulcimer after four decades playing guitar. The sweet sound, and many voices of the dulcimer opened up a new musical world and opportunities. It wasn't long before the dulcimer was integrated into the sound of her band, and she began teaching privately, at festivals, and at St. Francis Hospital where she worked as a therapeutic musician from 2015 until Covid hit in March of 2020. But Covid didn't slow her down. Carolyn has been a regular song leader, and two time mystery guest in Pat Clark's weekly "Send In The Music" jam since March of 2020. An award winning singer/songwriter, three of her original songs have appeared in the sampler of DPN, including her latest, "Mountain Jane Doe", which was in the April 2021 edition. www.carolynbrodginski.com

Sam Edelston comes to mountain dulcimers from the direction of chords, songs, and popular music (similar to how most people learn the guitar). He's on a mission to bring dulcimers to the general public through songs they already love in genres like rock, pop, folk, blues, country, and even jazz and classical music. (He's also written nearly 700 songs.) His online videos have been viewed over 1,000,000 times, in over 190 countries. Sam chairs the Nutmeg Dulcimer Festival, held every October in Milford, CT (or online 2020-2021). He's performed or taught at numerous folk festivals, dulcimer festivals (including MDMF many times), and other venues in the Northeast and across the country, as well as four QuaranTUNE Dulcimer Festivals and many other online festivals. His enthusiasm for this versatile instrument is apparent in his workshops which build a solid foundation for even the most inexperienced player. He has taught students from first grade to senior citizens - in school programs, and at festivals in the northeast and as far south as Florida. For 10 years George has been teaching dulcimer playing and dulcimer building (two separate classes) at "The Putney School" in Putney, Vermont, but has had to take the past 2 years "off" because of the pandemic. His CDs, Just Friends...One More Time and The Best of Just Friends are dulcimer instrumentals. She also designed the ocean scene for the top of her Timbre Hill dulcimer made by Paul Conrad. She has taught workshops at the Pocono Dulcimer Festival and at Music by the Bay in Barnegat, NJ. She loves teaching beginners and introducing people to this wonderful instrument!





Melanie Johnston has been playing Mountain Dulcimer since 2001. While living in Connecticut, she and her husband Mack co-founded the Northeast Dulcimer Orchestra and the Connecticut Mountain Dulcimer Gathering. Since moving to Asheville, NC in 2017, they have had extensive teaching and performing experience and have founded the Black Bear Dulcimer Gathering and the Asheville Dulcimer Orchestra. They perform as a duo with dulcimer, guitar and mandolin. Melanie is a graduate of the Dulcimer University/Western Carolina University certification program for teaching the Mountain Dulcimer. She teaches private students, classes and festival workshops in the New England, New York and North Carolina regions. In addition to playing and teaching dulcimer, Melanie has written *TablEdit for Mountain Dulcimer Arrangers*, available through Folkcraft Instruments.

Mack Johnston has 20+ years experience playing in mandolin ensembles and orchestras including the Providence Mandolin Orchestra. Mack was Music Director for the Northeast Dulcimer Orchestra 2013 – 2016. Since his move to Asheville NC in 2017, Mack has organized and now directs the Asheville Dulcimer Orchestra. Mack is a graduate of the Dulcimer University/Western Carolina University certification program for teaching the Mountain Dulcimer. He teaches private students, classes and festival workshops in the New England and North Carolina regions. Mack and his wife Melanie perform in the Asheville area as a duo with dulcimer, guitar and mandolin. Together they have written a book entitled, Dulcimer Jam Training Wheels. The book contains quarter note versions of many popular jam tunes.





Lori Keddell has been playing the dulcimer since 1985, and has taught classes and workshops for both children and adults in building and playing cardboard dulcimers. She was instrumental in organizing our first MDMF in 1989, and has been the coordinator since 1991. She was on the staff of the Cranberry Dulcimer and Autoharp Gathering from 1987 to 2016, and has been an instructor at numerous festivals in New York, VT, MA, PA and CT. With George Haggerty, she taught a weeklong Dulcimer Elderhostel class in Vermont for many years. She has published 5 books of arrangements for the mountain dulcimer, each with an accompanying CD. Her newest book, "Lullabies and Night Songs for the Mountain Dulcimer" contains 78 lullabies from around the world. She has also contributed many pieces of music to the monthly newsletter of the Dulcimer Association of Albany.

Sandy Lafleur from Wilton, NH has been playing and sharing her love of the dulcimer for over 25 years and has taught many workshops over the years at the DAA, Dulcimer Daze, and Nutmeg festivals, among others. A contra dancer, caller, and dance organizer her greatest joy comes from bringing people together around music. Her goal for her dulcimer students, whom she is now teaching on Zoom, is to help each player find their own unique musical voice. Sandy has a CD: "Amoskeag" which she recorded with her good friend Bill Perry on mandolin and guitar.
